

## Waterfall a wow in competition finalist in Oakridge

'Water is always a good feng shui sign ... meaning wealth,' home's designer says

nthree-storey waterfall beside a spectacular spiral staircase, but this Vancouver house has that — and more.

Designed by Eric Lee of Victor Frie Design Crown the

Designed by Eric Lee of Victor Eric Design Group, the home — a finalist in the Georgie Awards, an annual construction and renovation competition — is one where details abound. Lee, a 34-year-old self-taught designer who built his first home at the age of 18, was given free reign to incorporate his best ideas into the 5,000-square-foot custom home in Oakridge.

He took care of the home's architecture — inside and out — but also looked after the fine details, including the colours of paint and types of artwork.

Most of the decisions were left to Lee, since the homeowner, a businessman who also has a home in China, placed his utmost confidence in his designer.

The owner's only requests were that Lee create a home suitable for entertaining, with open-plan living, and that he prominently feature three prized liquor bottles. Lee met that request by placing the bot-

tles in lit art niches in the basement's state-of-the-art media room.

"He was a dream client. This was a chance of a lifetime to complete the whole vision," says Lee, who also chose all the furnishings, incorporating some of his own custom-made designs.

The results of Lee's efforts are evident from the moment the oversized front doors swing open, revealing a two-storey entry with the home's biggest "wow" feature: the spiral staircase and waterfall.

"Water is always a good feng shui sign. It means wealth and is good for business," says Lee, who believes this particular water feature is one of a kind for a residential property. The installer had created sim-

The installer had created similar larger waterfalls, where the water cascades in straight rows along mylar strands, but they were done for commercial projects. This was the first for a private home.

Stepping down to the main living area, the main feature is a fireplace with cast concrete surround.





Designer Eric Lee was asked by his Oakridge client to create a space suitable for entertaining, and he did precisely that in many areas of the 5,000-square-foot home, including the welcoming kitchen. Lee gave the room a clean, contemporary look, positioning the large dining table next to a good-sized island, ensuring ease of transition between meal-prep and mealtime. Cabinets are walnut; flooring is in-laid Carrera marble tile and Silver Sand marble. Adjacent to the kitchen is a pantry and a wok-cooking area.

Stepping down to the main living area, the main feature is a fireplace with cast concrete surround.

The room is one of modern elegance with 16-inch-high baseboards and cus-tom millwork that includes a horizontally-stacked, walnut partial-room divider. Within the millwork is a large aquarium, which helps to visually separate the living room from the adjacent

dining room, a step above.

In the dining room, Lee used a faux leather finish with fine stitches on the walls and had a chandelier installed,

similar to one in the entranceway.

The kitchen, which has a custom contemporary dining table off the large kitchen island, features walnut cabinets and flooring of in-laid Carrera marble tile and Silver Sand marble.
